Sacral Dimple - Normal

Definition

- A dimple is a small pit or depression in the skin
- Location: in the midline (center) of the lowest part of the back. It is near the tip of the tailbone. You can feel the tailbone under it.
- Hidden within the gluteal cleft ("butt crack"). Must separate the buttocks to see it.
- The dimple opening is very small, 5 mm or less across.

Health Information

Cause

- Minor birth defect
- Occurs in 4% of newborns

Birth Defects of the Lower Back that Doctors Do Worry About

- Some skin defects of the lower back may connect to a spinal cord defect. This is rare.
- Examples are a dimple that's higher up, a tuft of hair, a skin tag or any midline mass. A red or other birthmark of the lower back is also of some concern.
- These defects may need an MRI (special films) of the lower spine.
- Your child does not have this type of defect.

Care Advice

1. Overview:

- A sacral dimple in the gluteal cleft is harmless.
- It has no complications.

2. No Tests Needed:

• No special tests or X-rays are needed.

3. No Treatment Needed:

- No treatment is needed.
- It does not need any special cleaning.

4. What to Expect:

- It will always be there, but will not cause any future problems.
- It is not related to ingrown hair infections ("pilonidal cysts") seen in some adults.
